2024: A YEAR OF IMPACT AND PROGRESS AT GIAHC

2024 has been an extraordinary year for us and for the field in general with the support of the White House Cancer Moonshot team to reduce the burden of cervical cancer globally. As we approach the end of 2024, GIAHC is proud to reflect on a year filled with impactful initiatives and global partnerships aimed at eliminating HPV-related cancers starting with cervical cancer.

US vs HPV 2024: We started the year co-hosting our <u>sixth annual</u> US vs HPV Prevention week series with the American Medical Women's Association (AMWA). As in previous years, we had the privilege of hosting server experts and patient advocates who highlighted the key issues including disparities in prevention, diagnosis and treatment of HPV-related cancers.

Congressional Advocacy: During the week of the US vs HPV Prevention week, Dr. Krishnan was invited to join the HPV Coalition experts at a virtual <u>Congressional Briefing</u> to highlight the life-saving potential of HPV vaccination, screening, and early treatment, urging Congress to expand access nationwide.

White House Recognition: We also had the privilege of being invited to the White House for the inauguration of the <u>Cervical Cancer Forum</u> at the White House as part of the Cancer Moonshot Initiative. Dr. Krishnan participated in the discussions sharing innovate strategies for global cervical cancer prevention and care.

Awareness in India: To mark March 4th, International HPV Awareness Day, GIAHC partnered with Public Health Research Institute in Mysuru, India (PHRII) to provide HPV vaccination and school-based education initiatives, contributing to WHO's Global Strategy for Cervical Cancer Elimination. Advocacy at Capitol Hill: As part of the Healthy Girls, Healthy Women 2024 initiative, GIAHC Young Leaders advocated for HPV cancer elimination during a visit to the White House and Capitol Hill. More information is available in the Young Leaders section of the Newsletter.



New Partnership: In May, GIAHC teamed up with CAPED India an NGO in New Delhi, India to work together to raise HPV awareness among parents in that country. In addition, GIAHC is thrilled to have joined as a founding member of the Asia Pacific Women's Cancer Coalition with other esteemed partners to reduce the high burden of cervical cancer in that region.

International Collaboration: In August 2024, GIAHC was honored to be invited to join the White House delegation for the very first U.S.-India Cancer Dialogue, presenting on equitable cancer therapies and advancing discussions on AI, genomics, and innovative cancer care. Dr. Krishnan presented on "Cost Effective Cancer Therapy and Implementation Science" addressing the burden of cervical cancer and emphasizing how HPV vaccination, screening, and early treatment could help reduce this preventable disease, even in remote areas of the developing world. We are hopeful that the discussions will the a renewed commitment to collaboration between the two countries in the fight against cancer.

World Cancer Congress (WCC) 2024: In September, GIAHC members attended <u>WCC</u> hosted by the Union for International Cancer Control in Geneva. The Congress aimed to strengthen participants' actions and impact on national, regional, and international scales through a multidisciplinary program that highlighted the latest successful interventions in cancer prevention, diagnosis, treatment, and care.

Global Recognition: At the UN General Assembly in September, GIAHC was humbled to be listed as part of "Quad Cancer Moonshot team" collaborating with partners to take bold action #cervicalcancer in the Asia Pacific region. Together, we are committed to eliminating this disease for a healthier future.

A Full Circle: In late September, Dr. Krishnan attended the centennial celebration of her alma mater in Mysuru, India. Here she was recognized for her work with HPV and cervical cancer elimination by her medical school. This event lent so much more meaning when she launched the Mysuru Consortium Against Cervical Cancer with her alma mater-Mysore Medical College and other institutions including PHRII who will be leading this effort locally.

Rising from WCC 2024: The Call to Eliminate Cervical Cancer and Our First Victory Over Cancer

The discussions at #WCC2024 ignited a powerful sense of hope and urgency. The path to eliminating #HPV and #cervicalcancer is clear, but it demands bold action-now. We are armed with the knowledge, technology, and tools to wipe out this preventable disease, which still claims a woman's life every two minutes. If we do nothing, that number will rise to a woman every 90 seconds by 2050, unleashing untold devastation on families, communities, and nations alike

We have no excuse to let this happen. The tools to end these unnecessary deaths are in our hands: #HPVvaccination #screening, and #earlytreatment. These are not just medical interventions; they are weapons in a fight we can win.

The healthcare community has made strides, but that is not enough-we need a united public movement to finish this fight. The time is now to mobilize. We must arm people with the knowledge to demand the care they deserve: HPV vaccinations, self-screening for cervical cancer, and access to life-saving treatments. The HPV vaccine isn't just a shield against cervical cancer-it prevents six different cancers across all genders. This is not a women's issue-it's a global fight that impacts us all.

We must also turn our focus to low- and middle-income countries, where the toll is highest. Equity in healthcare is nonnegotiable. Technology and innovation are our keys to ensuring every woman, no matter where she lives, has the same chance to live free from this disease

History has shown us the power of grassroots movements. The fight against HIV/AIDS was won through public activism, relentless awareness, and demand for care. Now, we must spark that same fire in the battle against HPV-related cancers-starting with cervical cancer

Healthcare leaders, advocates, and the public must rise as one. Let this be our rallying cry: We will not wait. We will not lose more lives. We will make cervical cancer the first cancer we defeat.

Together, we can rewrite the future, eliminating cervical cancer and ensuring a healthier world for generations to come The time for action is now-let's claim our first victory over cancer.#GlobalCancerMoonshot

tute of India (PHRII), a non-profit organisation based out of Mysuru, has joined hands with Dr. Shobha Krishnan, a graduate of Mysore Medical College and Founder of Global Initiative Against HPV and Cervical Cancer, to start this Consortium. PHRII, which is serving the

local communities since 2007, is involved in healthcare delivery,

health education, research and has provided free care to over 20,000 Mysureans. "One woman dies every eight minutes in India from cervical cancer and these institutions will collaborate to mitigate this preventable disease with state-of-the-art cervical cancer screening programmes and research more effective ways to save our mothers, wives sisters and daughters from these needless deaths," stated a press

release from PHRII. PHRII has collaborated with MMC&RI in providing education on cervical cancer to nursing students. It plans to launch a Cervical Cancer Specialty Centre in January 2025, with the latest equipment and facilities to screen

for and prevent cervical cancer.

In 2024 the GIAHC Young Leaders have been busy with initiatives, collaborations, and outreach events!

February: GIAHC YL marked World Cancer Day by collaborating with Public Research Health Institute on a program to vaccinate 193 adolescent girls in rural Mysuru District.

March: March 4th is International HPV Awareness Day, the day that the global spotlight shines on a virus that we have the tools to eliminate and the ability to prevent the cancers that HPV can cause. Our young leaders launched a report to raise HPV awareness and educate healthcare trainees.

April: The GIAHC YL's created a report showcasing our contributions to the global fight against cervical cancer, aligned with the World Health Organization's 90-70-90 strategy.

May: GIAHC YL's announced the partnership with Caped India and made posts to mark Women's Health Month.

June-July: The teen GIAHC YL's visited Capitol Hill and President Biden's Cancer Moonshot team at the White House. This event was organized by HPV Cancers Alliance as a part of their Healthy Girls, Healthy Women 2024 initiative.



August: GIAHC YL's announced the launch of the US-India Cancer Dialogue Initiative. This initiative aims to strengthen U.S.-India ties & reduce cancer through better prevention, detection, & treatment.

September: In honor of Gynecological Awareness Month, GIAHC YL's made posts to raise awareness about cancers that affects women's reproductive health

October: GIAHC YL's expanded their membership to include more members from Malawi and Nepal.

November: One Egg-A-Day Fundraise for Rwanda: In partnership with the Elekta Foundation, GIAHC Young Leaders launched a program to provide cervical cancer patients with nutritious support during treatment. A small donation can make a big impact—visit **giahc.org/donate** to support this cause.


